Opening of Lepelle Nkumpi Fire station Welcome by the Mayor of Lepelle Nkumpi Municipality

Our colleagues from the district municipality will remember the many calls they received from us and from the members of the public in this regard. We are however happy that ultimately we have been able to get to this point where we can officially have the station opened.

This comes at a very critical time when municipalities and government under general have come to the realisation that there is a great need to protect our investments. We should remember that when private investors consider putting up structures in an area one of the greatest considerations they make is the risk associated with investing in that area. The risk is not only in terms of sales not realised but also in the risk of loss of property due to amongst others fires. As a municipality we have seen this happen on a number of occasions - the recent one being the almost total destruction of the score supermarket just next to us by fire. It is obvious that when something like that happens other potential investors will consider how the municipality was able to deal with the disaster. It there can have a far greater impact than just loss to that one investor. We consider ourselves blessed in that in spite of our inability to deal with these threats our investors have stuck it out with us and more have shown an interest in investing here. The most recent of this is the MedLeb project.

We therefore today feel a little bit comfortable that we can be able to say to those people who come to invest here that we can be able to offer them some sort of peace of mind in the fact that we have some capacity to deal with fire threats. But this is not only limited to investors but also to our residents. We acknowledge that without residents there will not be any investors. Therefore our residents are the very reason why we do all these things. We can today say that they can rest a little easy knowing that we have the means to face the threats that face them.

With these words I would like to say to all our guests that you are heartily welcome. You can be proud of the fact that you will today be part of history in the making. We are also confident that all those from outside the municipality will find that the municipality and its people are ready to welcome you with open arms and you will hopefully make this your future home.
